Activity 1 EarthDayPOSTCARDActivityGrades1 - 12

Students write a postcard to the Federal Minister of Environment & Climate Change.

Be brief & respectful, that's the best way to be listened to.

Don't forget to send them! (No stamp is required to send letters to Parliament.)

- Use resources below to inform & inspire students before they start the postcard.
- On the postcard, include student first name, teacher name, school, community.
- On the reverse of the postcard, students do art to match their comments.
- 1. Preparing postcards: Print Page 2 of this PDF single-sided (two postcards per sheet). Photocopy as many one-sided sheets as required & cut each page in half.
- 2. Start the postcard activity with a lesson from this resource list:
 - A. K-12 Sierra Club Learn to Draw Videos on BC Endangered Species https://sierraclub.bc.ca/learn-to-draw-b-c-wildlife-art-lesson-series-with-julius-csotonyi-webinar/ Use these free 1 hour video lessons to come up with written & artistic content for the postcard. Videos are science based, easy to follow (pause them) & include Indigenous content. There are many animals: spotted owls, mountain caribou, orcas, octopus, etc.
 - B. K-12 CBEEN (Columbia Basin Environmental Education Network)

- **C. Grades 6-12 How to Change Everything**: Play the 4 minute audio excerpt from "How to Change Everything, Naomi Klein's book to inspire youth to engage in climate action. Then in your class discuss how ideas for their postcard to engage government. https://soundcloud.com/simonschuster/how-to-change-everything
- **D. Grades 6 to 12: Watch "A Message from the Future",** Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez gives a brief history of the climate crisis, and what we could choose to do about it, if only we have the political will. 

Activity 2

Earth Day Less is More Clothing Challenge 1-12

Earth Day Activity Poster on next page (page 4).

- A. Start lesson by brainstorming how the clothing industry contributes to climate change & environmental degradation (deforestation, air/water/soil pollution).
- B. Discus wants versus needs and consumerism. Buying only what we need and then doing what we can to make our clothes last as long as possible helps conserve habitat for other living things.
- C. Watch the Ted Ed Lifecycle of a T-shirt video: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=BiSYoegb_VY&vl=en
- D. Assign students to come on Earth Day wearing items that have been in their wardrobe a long time because they have been repaired, are hand me downs, remodeled, or bought second hand.
- E. On Earth Day have students share the story of their garments and review how we need to buy only what we need, and them treat them well so they last a long time.
