### Lesson plan

Lesson Inspired by: The Littlest Dinosaur Written by: Bryce Raffle & Steven Kothlow, Illustrated by: Tessa Verplancke More resources at: littlestdinosaur.square.site

Topic: Literature/Writing

Grade: 5-7

### Objectives:

Students are able to understand the story and begin writing their own stories. They can understand the basics of creative writing and feel inspired to write creatively.

#### Time:

2 lessons (45-60 minutes each)

#### Materials:

- The Littlest Dinosaur (book)
- Free Creative Writing Worksheet

#### Steps:

- 1. Read The Littlest Dinosaur aloud. Discuss the story. Ask students to share what kind of stories they would like to tell.
- 2. Introduce key concepts of creative writing: characters, setting, conflict (a problem to be solved), and obstacles. Work through the creative writing worksheet (Part One). If not complete, students can complete as homework or complete in the next lesson.
- 3. Review Creative Writing Worksheet (Part One). Students may then begin working through the Creative Writing Worksheet (Part Two) laying out each page of the 32-page outline. If not complete, students can complete as homework.

#### INTRODUCTION

#### WHAT IS A PICTURE BOOK?

A picture book is a book, typically written for children, with illustrations on many of the pages. Picture books are typically about 32 pages long and do not have chapters like chapter books.

#### WHY SHOULD I WRITE A PICTURE BOOK?

First, because it can be a lot of fun to use your imagination, to come up with your own characters and stories, and draw pictures to go with it! Second, it's a great way to practice your writing skills. It's also much shorter than a chapter book or a novel, so it should be easier to write, and kids your age or younger may enjoy your story. If you publish it, people may decide they want to purchase your book to read, so you could even earn a little bit of money for your efforts.


